




End of Year 9 project



Year 7 student S Mumford created an wonderful birthday cake for his dad, and it looked amazing. He worked very hard to create the cake completely from scratch - well done!









Modern Foreign Languages

Year 9 Spanish

Our Year 9 students have been successfully working hard on really complex GCSE Spanish structures, grammar and vocabulary. Mrs Unsworth has been so impressed with their work, that for their final lesson, she sent them on an all expenses paid (virtual) interactive tour of Madrid and Havana. The students developed both their linguistic and cultural knowledge of these two very different cities and then put their new knowledge to the test in a quiz. 


Year 8 Drama – Macbeth

Macbeth becomes King of Scotland but feels scared that he may be discovered as the murderer. He orders that Banquo and his son, Fleance to be killed, but the Fleance escapes.







At a celebration dinner, Macbeth sees the Banquo's ghost and starts acting very strange. Lady Macbeth tries to calm him but was too scared.

Macbeth looks for the witches and learns from them that he will be safe until wood goes to his castle. The sisters tell him that he should only fear someone who wasn't born from a woman.









Macbeth goes on a reign of terror and many people are murdered, including Macduff's family. Macduff goes to join Malcolm and they decide to lead an army against Macbeth.



Macduff challenges Macbeth. Macbeth soon finds out that Macduff wasn't born from a woman, but was born from a C-section (Caesarian birth)

Below is Year 7 student J Crowhurst's great on his game:



- 1. Each player starts with 20 points
- 2. The first player to reach 0 points wins
- 3. Each activity can reduce your points total or increase it if you fail!
- Two Dice Throw less than 6 to start. If you take more than three throws, add 5
 points and start.



- 6. Stand on one leg for 30 seconds minus 3 points for success, add 2 if you fail
- 7. From 3m for adults and 2m for children, bounce three table tennis ball into the cups.



- From 4m for adults and 2m for children you have to throw three bean bags into a bucket, each bean bag in the bucket you can subtract 3 points from your total but if you miss you add 1 point.
- From 4m for adults and 2m for children, throw three tennis balls into the hoops (be careful of the bounce!).



Green hoops = -2 points Blue hoops = -4 points Red hoop = -6 Miss = +2 points

- 10. Each player has to do "the plank"
 - a. 10 seconds = -1 point
 - b. 20 seconds = -2 points
 - c. 30 seconds = -3 points
 - d. >1 minute = -6 points
- 11. If there is now winner, each player starts again at number 5.
- 12. Continue until there is a winner!









Treasure map


Year 8 student E Knight has created a brilliant a treasure map for her little sister including a map, and clues at each location which lead to a treat at the end. What brilliant work!








P Smart has also designed a great treasure hunt - both girls have clearly been very inventive in their recent project. What a great job!
