Perfect Pitch - Getting higher and lower and precision

Children will begin to sing simple songs with expression and explore creative ways in which the voice can be used.

Year 2



African Music

Pulse, rhythm and Ostinato

- Play on tuned and untuned instruments
- Create short rhythmic patterns and vary the tempo



Body songs

- Singing in tune
- Read and write graphic representations of rising and falling pitch
 - Sign in rounds





Choose sound to match pictures, rehearse composition sounds to represent a picture, scene and emotion...





- Listening and appraising

Year 3





Pupils will learn to play musical instruments, with increased accuracy, fluency and control. They will be introduced to key composers and pieces.



Stone Age Village Compositions

Improvisation and Composition

- Compose using given forms
- Select appropriate instruments for compositions and start to perform in groups



Ancient Greece

Compare music using the terms faster or slower and hold a melody line with confidence showing control in singing.



The Rainforest

- Recognise the sounds of individual instruments
- Sing and play untuned instruments together
- Begin to explore rhythmic patterns to compose a piece







Food, glorious food

- Read and write notes A C, progressing to A - E
- Begin to practice using expression in your singing and develop listening

Musical recital - parents and carers are invited to view a musical recital with the instruments their children have been learning



First Access Lessons

Students will be introduced to a variety of brass instruments, and will learn to play their chosen instrument with increased accuracy, fluency and control.

Romans, Vikings and invasion

- Compose using given forms Read and write notes A-C on a single line, progressing to A-E on two lines

Weather and seasons

Pupils will explore textures, harmony and Baroque Music. They will recognise the sounds of individual instruments and be able to develop skills percussion instruments in groups...

Year 5



Water

- Exploring melodic shapes and dynamics
- Read and write notes A-G
- Develop performing skills
- Take turns to both lead and direct the group





Space

Exploring programme music and dynamics

- An introduction to the terms and symbols for *crescendo* and *diminuendo*
- Perform in student-led ensemble





Victorians

Exploring street cries and Music Hall

- An introduction to musical language for tempo: *lento* (slowly) and *allegro* (quickly)
- Recognise the sound of individual instruments in an ensemble, and their contribution to the overall sound









Animal Crackers - Children will explore descriptive music and be able to play tuned and untuned instruments in two parts.

Students will show confidence in part singing, and sing with increasing control and expression, both individually and in groups.

Year 6



Music of the Far East

- Exploring the pentatonic scale
 Pupils will play three-part ensembles
- rhythm, harmony and melody
 - Student-led ensemble

Britain since 1930

Exploring music of the Second World War

Pupils will show an awareness of musical shape in their singing - show, fluency, expression and accuracy.





Pictures at an exhibition

Pupils will explore music and art. They will use and understand musical terms such as: Pianissimo, Mezzo-piano, Mezzo-forte, Forte, Fortissimo, Crescendo and Diminuendo.

Pupils will be able to read and write notes middle C to top G on a treble clef staff, incorporating bar lines, time signatures and rests.

Popular music

Appraising - 8 question written exam
(1h15m - 40% of final grade - held in June of Year 11)
Students are examined on eight questions in total, two on each of the four areas of study listed above.






Creating

Continue work on performance and composition piece(s), in readiness for your final work to be sent to the exam board.

A-Level assessment

Students will be assessed in 3 forms for A Level, and they have the choice of either Option A or Option B:

Option A (Performance specialism):

- 3 or more performances (35% of grade)
 - 2 compositions (25% of grade)

Option B (Composition specialism):

- 2 performances (25% of grade)
- 3 compositions (35% of grade)



2h15m | 40% of A Level grade

All students will complete a written exam on:

Music in the 20th Century or 21st century as well as the 4

areas of study in Year 12.
