Spotlight on Learning Lower KS2

Pupils in Year 3 and 4 did some fantastic learning last term.



In Year 3, the learning theme was 'Heroes', with a history focus on Ancient Greece. They found out about famous Greek heroes, Gods and Goddesses.

In Art, children learnt about ancient Greek pottery, analysing different designs and patterns to then create their very own ancient Greek pot!

In English, Year 3 linked their theme learning by reading a variety of Greek myths and legends. By connecting the stories, finding similarities and differences, they were able to identity what they needed to include in their mythical writing. The children enjoyed acting out scenes from 'Theseus and the Minotaur'.

























Year 4 were excitedly learning all about the Romans in preparation for their successful residential trip. They immersed themselves in Roman culture by creating their own mosaics. They soon realised how long it takes to create such intricate designs.

In English, they learnt about Boudicca – Queen of the Iceni - and how they could help her write a persuasive speech to convince her warriors to go to battle against the Romans.



In science, the children were learning all about the three states of matter - solid, liquid and gas. They used their drama skills to become the three different states, to understand their properties. They had a fantastic time on their first residential trip doing lots of wonderful things, including visiting the York Chocolate Story to learn how chocolate changes its state from solid to liquid and back to solid again



Chick Watch

At the end of term 4, our science faculty launched 'Chick Watch'. This was a new STEM (Science, Technology, Maths and Engineering) project linking to learning about 'Growth' from British Science Week. This two week experiment began with eggs hatching in an incubator, live in school. We ran several competitions around the event including naming the chicks, the egg drop where the children designed a structure to help protect an egg in the event of a fall and the age old debate; what came first? The chicken or the egg!

The chicks were streamed live on MS Teams allowing the children to watch their development in real time—did you see an egg hatch? This experiment allowed us to link our learning with other schools across the country for the children to see. Lots of us also got the chance to hold a chick.

At the end of the two week experiment, we are pleased to say that all the chicks were rehomed with one of our supply teachers who has raised chicks for many years. Thanks for Miss Carter and the science department for co-ordinating this successful all-through project which engaged all the children from YR—Y13.
