Let's Get Cooking!

In November, Mrs Honeywood, together with Miss Losty and Mrs Robson relaunched our 'Let's Get Cooking' extra-curricular club for a select group of Year 5/6 children. The children had the chance to make some classic dishes and to learn some important cooking skills in our fully equipped kitchen, within the secondary building.

The first session was an important introduction to food safety and cooking skills. In this session, the children learnt knife skills, including a bridge hold, claw grip and how to peel, slice and cut safely. They also learnt how to use the various bits of equipment, including the oven and a grater, how to read a recipe, adjust cooking time and independently measure ingredients.

During the sessions, the children made a number of dishes from scratch including vegetable soup, cookies, pizza (both the dough and sauce), lasagne, including a tricky cheese sauce and sweet and sour chicken,

During the sessions, the children practiced preparing vegetables by mashing, shredding, using scissors to snip, scooping, crushing and grating. They all learnt all about food hygiene.

We think you'll agree, Mrs Honeywood managed to squeeze a lot of useful life skills and yummy food into the sessions; hopefully, parents enjoyed the dishes that the children brought home.





Term 3 - Roundup in Pictures

Foundation Stage

Foundation Stage have had a very busy time this term learning all about their Learning Theme 'A Ticket to Ride'. They thought carefully about what values might make a superhero and they welcomed many of our real-life superheroes into school to find out all about their jobs.

Along with the theme learning, children in EYFS have also been developing their fine motor skills using a range of tools including paintbrushes, scissors, pencils, tweezers and Play Doh.



Key Stage 1

In Year 1, children have been following the journey of the Gingerbread Man across the UK to visit traditional tale characters. As part of their Sensational Start, they took part in a scavenger hunt around the KS1 hub to look for all the fairytale characters.

Year 1 have also been learning all about measurements and the different way you can measure objects. They have lots of fun measuring each other using the building blocks.

In Year 2, children started their new Learning Theme of 'Through the Keyhole'. They have been finding out all about life in the Tudor times. They have learnt all about what it was like living life as a Tudor child, as well as the battle of the Tudor rose and how it links to the local area. In maths, they have been practicing 2, 5 and 10 times tables, as well as learning about simple fractions.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Y3/4)



In Year 3, their Sensational Start was based around learning about the Stone Age. Their favourite part was experiencing what it was like to paint in a cave by creating their own cave art under the table in the classroom with the lights off! Year 3 have also been learning to master the 3, 4 and 8 times tables, as well as listening to stories in the LRC.

In Year 4, they have been learning about the elements. They started the term by working in teams to make their own earthquake-proof building using junk modelling. The children worked as teams to come up with some very creative structures.



Upper Key Stage 2 (Y5/6)



As part of their Learning Theme "Journeys", Year 5 have been exploring human hourneys and the different reasons for these. In art, the children made their own traditional South African Ndebele art pieces, based on bright colours, use of patterns and symmetry.

Year 6 have been learning about China and Japan for their "Enchanting East" learning theme. As part of their Sensational Start, they made origami frogs, designed some Manga art and took part in the Smarties chopstick challenge!
