British Science Week



British Science Week is always a highlight of our academic calendar and this year is no exception. Each year group picked their own focus with some very interesting experiments.

Some of the highlights included Foundation Stage children learning about the life cycle of a seed. They planted and grew their own cress and observed the changes over time. Once the cress was fully grown, the children made and enjoyed their own cress sandwiches. They also investigated colour mixing by making their own rainbows.

Another highlight was in Lower KS2 where the focus was on strategy and collaboration! The children explored various scientific enquiries, including: creating a swinging pendulum to measure time and designing a vehicle to travel as quickly as possible across a set distance. In groups, the children used self-regulation to test and improve their strategies in order to achieve the best outcomes. We were very proud of the resilience and teamwork shown by our scientists in Years 3 and 4!











As part of the week, children from Year 5 and 6 were invited to take part in our annual Science Fair together with students in Year 7-8; we were also pleased to welcome children in UKS2 from Woodland View Primary School. In total, we had over 150 participants—our biggest ever.

Some of our sixth formers kindly volunteered their time to help our younger students work on presentations over many lunchtimes.

On the day, students proudly showcased their incredible science, technology or maths themed inventions with the winning project being chosen by a panel of external judges. Congratulations to our 1st place project designed by two of our Year 7 students.
